Senior band compete in National Finals

After qualifying for the National Brass Band Finals last March on Friday 13th September the band travelled to the racecourse at Cheltenham to take part in the finals competition on the Saturday morning. This is where bands from all over the Country who have qualified in their rounds come together to compete against each other for the title.

The music chosen for our section was a very descriptive piece called the Shipbuilders written by Peter York. It was commissioned in 1960 and is in four movements, Web of Steel, The Launching, All Hands at Work and Maiden Voyage, as the title of the movements suggest it tells the story of the building of a magnificent ocean going liner.

We knew it would be an early start on the Saturday as the order of draw was due to take place at 7.45am with the first band on stage at 9.00am. Everyone was up and ready in the breakfast room for 6.30am.

We are very grateful to Robert and Margaret Turnbull from the Yorkshire Area Committee, who were officiating all weekend and kindly offered to go to the order of draw for us.

Once again we managed to book the St Nicolas church hall (which is always in great demand on this particular weekend as it is only a 2 minute drive from the racecourse) for a rehearsal before the competition.

The phone call from Margaret came around 8.05am with the news we had drawn to play number 7 out of the 20 band competing. This would do nicely as it meant we could have a short rehearsal before going to the venue for our scheduled arrival time of 9.30am.

The racecourse is a huge place and the Centaur is the main hall which holds over 2000 people although there is never that number of people watching any of the bands.

We took our place on stage at 10.30am, the green light was on which meant the adjudicators, Sandy Smith, John Maines and Nicholas Garman were ready for us to begin. When we had finished we felt we had played as well as we could, no big problems just a few little clicks which could be the nerves at work. So now the wait begins for the results.

During the competition the social media is at work, two sites in particular which are followed by brass banders are 4barsrest and British Bandsman, they offer comments after each band has played and it is interesting what they had to say about our performance. 4barsrest reported: A thoroughly engaging accounts from the Yorkshire representative, with neat styling and warm sounds. The opening call and response of Web of Steel were the best of the day so far, the Launch and All Hands at Work offered great contrast and the stylish Maiden Voyage set sail with echoes of the Queen Mary at full title heading to New York.

The British Bandsman commented that the standard of the bass end so far had been exceptional, WOW, What a powerful back row. (our cornet players loved this comment!) they go on to say really nice things about the band and said the Euphonium playing gave them Goosebumps.

Nice comments indeed but what mattered is what the adjudicators thought.

In their comments they said things like. "Opening has purpose well done, good tempo, good attention to detail. Opening movement three not quite settled, some nice moments, Euphonium and Cornet are both lyrical and confident" "A good show just with a few issues, A very good start, just a few insecurities, Excellent soloists and a lovely finish"

Prizes on offer were 1st £1,000 plus trophy, 2nd £750 plus trophy, 3rd £500 plus trophy, and a special trophy for the most outstanding player.

The time came for the results first six in reverse order:

6th Nailsworth Silver-West of England

5th Morecambe—North West

4th Clifton and Lightcliffe—Yorkshire

3rd Croy Silver—Scotland

2nd Flookburgh Silver-North of England

1st Goldborne—North West



Excellent result for Clifton, we were delighted to be placed in the first 6. The best is still to come. Prize for the most outstanding player of the section was our very own Adrian Harrison on Euphonium. A wonderful achievement, the Goosebumps must have extended to the adjudicators chamber too.

So overall an excellent weekend for the band, 4th position out of 20 band from all over the Country is a really good achievement. Due to our good results over the past two years we will be promoted to the second section from 1st January 2025.

Well done to John Clay our Musical Director for all his hard work preparing the band, Derek Broadbent who came in to a couple of rehearsals to 'put the icing on the cake' to the band members and especially to Adrian for his lovely playing on the day.



We sat down ready to start at 2.30pm and around 50 people turned up with garden chairs to hear the band. It ended up being a nice afternoon with an appreciative audience.

Passing of Derek Garside

Derek Garside one of the country's finest cornet players in his day sadly passed away on 28th July aged 94. Derek started his playing career as a 9 year old and shortly after with lessons from Fred Roberts he joined his local band Clifton and Lightcliffe where he stayed until he was invited to play with the Brighouse and Rastrick Band. In 1947 at the age of 17 he was invited to play Principal Cornet with the then famous CWS Manchester Band where he was also offered employment in the accounts department. During his time with CWS he recorded many solos which are still revered today. Derek never forgot where he started his playing and returned to Clifton to take part in a concert during the 1970's with his

wife Janne accompanying him on the piano. The picture shows Derek, his wife Janne and James Nuttall conductor of Clifton.

Last year the band presented a new trophy called the Derek Garside Shield at our Annual Dinner which is presented to the best instrumentalist of the year and it was awarded to David Crisp our Principal Cornet in recognition of his leadership.

Derek's funeral was held on Thursday 29th August at Central Methodist Church Brighouse and was very well attended by many of the banding fraternity.



Brighouse Gala 29th June

The Gala this year was held at Lane Head Recreation ground due to Wellholme Park being closed while the flood defences are carried out. We had our usual fund raising activities including, teddy string pull, tombola, chicken in a basket and guess the teddy's name. A very valuable source of income for the band over a number of years now is our weekly 125 club draw.



Spotlight—Adrian Harrison

Adrian was delighted to have been awarded the Most Outstanding Player at the Cheltenham Brass Band Finals last month. Adrian as you can read has had a number of spells with the band and is currently our principal euphonium along with his wife Panette who plays the soprano cornet. After winning the award at Cheltenham I asked Adrian to write a piece about himself and his playing career.

I was first taught to play in 1961 aged seven on flugel horn with the Brighouse Salvation Army, later switching to cornet and also spells on tenor horn and baritone. When I was fourteen I taught myself



the trombone by listening and working out the slide positions. I left the Salvation Army in 1971 and went to join Clifton and Lightcliffe as a Bb bass player, mainly due to the fact that my father was their drummer at that time. During my time there I was asked to join the younger members of the band to go on Saturday mornings to the Queensbury Music Centre under the direction of James Shepherd.

In 1972 I decided to enlist in the army and was auditioned and accepted on Eb bass with the Regimental Band of the Irish Guards where I stayed for the next three years. During my last year with them I also travelled back and forth to Hammonds Sauce Works band based in Bradford on a weekly basis travelling back to London via the night mail train. After leaving the army I returned to Clifton as solo euphonium, then on to Lindley band. I took a break from playing in 1982 but eventually was asked to join Clifton again.

In 1985 I joined the Yorkshire Volunteers Territorial Army Band but continued with Clifton. I also played with various other bands but eventually work interfered and I had to put by brass banding on hold. I eventually joined the West Yorkshire Police Band on bass trombone and was their first civilian member, this is an association I still have today helping them on many occasions.

Once my working hours settled I joined the Jayess 87 band under the direction of James Shepherd and this was when they had their golden spell working through the sections, eventually they integrated with the Jayess Queensbury band and became the Yorkshire Coop Band.

My time with the Yorkshire Volunteers Band came to an end as the defence budget was cut in 1999, however, I could transfer to the Lancashire Artillery Band based at Bolton. This was also that year I received the Lord Lieutenant's Certificate for my services to the TA. Unfortunately ill health forced me to relinquish my brass banding for a number of years but after three years I started playing again this time on trumpet with the Bradford Metropolitan Concert Band and once again ended up on euphonium playing with the band and various dance bands. I answered an urgent appeal from the City of Bradford band and more latterly I enjoyed spells with Clifton B Band, BD1 Brass, Drighlington Band and Yorkshire Imperial before returning once again to Clifton following the Covid pandemic.
